# The purist approach to high-res heaven

As single-minded approaches go, Bryston's BDP-1 takes some beating. Think of it as a stripped-down computer, tuned for audio quality. As a consequence, the design is sparse: no touchscreen display or internal transport, and no streaming circuitry, storage or DAC. Bryston maintains these frills add noise and degrade audio performance.

The BDP-1 simply takes music data from a memory stick or hard drive via one of its four USB inputs, processes the data and squirts it out digitally for an external DAC to complete the task.

## Making the right connections

The natural partner for this digital player is Bryston's well regarded BDA-1 DAC, reviewed in full on p17. We're fans of this product's connectivity and even-handed sound.

Despite the emergence of newer rivals, the BDA-1 remains a talented proposition. Whatever you use, as long as the number cruncher has either an electrical S/PDIF connection or an AES/EBU, all will be fine.

One of the BDP-1's aces is the ability to replay files up to 24-bit/192kHz. These high-resolution files lift the sound of this Bryston pair well above any CD player we've heard when it comes to outright detail, subtlety and fluidity.

Listen to a 24-bit/192kHz recording such as The Scottish Chamber Orchestra's rendition of Beethoven's *Piano Concerto No.3* and the sense of space is astonishing. Not just the space that defines the venue, but that between instruments, too. There's also a spell-binding finesse, a lightness of touch that once heard is hard to do without.



You can't stream through these two, but the sound they deliver is a revelation Switching to a WAV version of Kanye West's Monster is a bit disappointing. It's not just the resolution drop; the pair's subtle lack of rhythmic drive becomes more apparent with music such as this.

The BDP-1 proves that there's life beyond CD. And if the choice of high-res content grows sufficiently, it's a future we'll relish.
